United Way works with individuals, organizations and key partners in KFL&A to build and strengthen our community bringing people and resources together to facilitate change. Our vision is a future where people are self-sufficient in a community, where individuals live with hope, dignity and a sense of belonging.

Since the start of the pandemic the need for meal and food programs has grown exponentially, with



1,600 meals being served every day



3,300 hampers/baskets being delivered every month to low-income seniors, students and families.

“ In a typical year, the Food Sharing Project provides fresh food and snacks at 88 schools across the region, serving over 16,000 students in a school year.

This past spring, when schools and workplaces were closed due to the pandemic, the Food Sharing Project shifted to a home delivery model. Logistically, there was a lot to figure out, but we knew we had to because the children who counted on us at school for their nutritional needs were just at home. With the support of the United Way, we delivered a box of fresh food to families' doors or monthly grocery gift cards to almost 600 families. Every week our drivers heard how much families appreciated the support from their community – one family referred to it as their “luxury box.” Remember, the box just had basic foods, like apples, oranges, cheese, milk and bread. When we receive our grant from United Way we go right to the grocery store or local supplier and we purchase the food that children need to access what school has for them, whether it is remotely or at school. You can be confident that your donation stays right here and supports students and their families. ”
