ALOY is a unique one-year program designed to provide individual, group, and cultural experiences that help build leadership and life skills. As part of the program, ALOY cadets are enrolled at RMC for one academic year as an Officer Cadet in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF). They are paid at that rank level and receive free tuition and books, and may request to leave the program at any time. The ALOY program includes sports, field trips, leadership development, military training and cultural support activities. At the end of the academic year, provided they meet the academic requirements, ALOY cadets will be given the opportunity to apply to continue at RMC in a degree program as a member of the CAF, under the Regular Officer Training Plan (ROTP) or they can apply to become a Non-Commissioned member (NCM) of the CAF.</p> |
